Dear Mr. Seldon:

Enclosed is the Annual Report for 1980 referencing the activities of the Winchester Fire Department.

The department responded to a total of 857 incidents resulting in a total estimated property loss of \$366,716. As compared to 1979 this would reflect an increase of 3% in total incidents and an increase 29% in property loss directly related to fire.

During 1980 a total of 129 tests were administered to Winchester firefighters by Virginia Fire Service Training. The subject material of the test ranged from the basic skills of a firefighter to management skills for the officer. The passing rate for Winchester firefighters was approximately 86%.

Both paid and volunteer personnel of the department have attended seminars and conferences outside the City. These seminars have been in specialized subject material such as Arson, Volunteer Fire Company Management and Agricultural Chemicals. This training develops greater expertise locally and enables the department to better serve the community.

In addition, the department in cooperation with Virginia Fire Services Training and the Northern Virginia Firefighters' Association has sponsored two statewide training sessions within the City. This type of training program expands the knowledge of Winchester personnel as well as creates an atmosphere of cooperation with neighboring jurisdictions.

The initiation of 911 has proven to be a great asset to fire protection for the citizens. This three digit number is one that can be easily remembered and expedites the receipt of fire calls to the Emergency Communications Center. With further publicity the advent of this system will prove more advantageous in the future.

The Public Fire Education Program has continued through 1980, with overwhelming interest. Civic groups, industry, and other occupancies within the City have continued to support this program. Through the continuation of this program in future years the public will become more aware of the fire problem and the Fire Department will be better

prepared to deal with specific areas of fire protection.

Arson has continued to be a major area of concern for the department. Through a cooperative effort of various civic groups and the department, an "Arson Reward Program" was initiated during 1980. This program initially indicates great promise in combating this crime.

The cooperation of the volunteer companies can not go unrecognized. Each individual has put forth optimum effort to provide the citizens with the best possible fire protection. This type of dedication is inspiring and readily identifies that the combination volunteer/paid system is workable. Through continued effort and cooperation this type of system should continue.

During 1980 a committee of citizens was formulated to aid in establishing an open line of communications between the Fire Department and the community. This committee has been of assistance in several issues since their formation and it is hoped that they shall remain active in the future.

I would also like to express my gratitude to you and Council for the support given me in the past year. I would pledge to you my continued cooperation and through a combined effort Fire Protection to the community will be achieved.





SUBJECT: Fire Operations Report 1980

The following is an informational and statistical report of the activities of Friendship Fire Co. (Engine Co. 1) for the year 1980.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR:

Fifteen complete sets of turnout gear were purchased. All active members are currently being outfitted with this new gear.

The company accepted into membership its first female firefighter.

An order for a new pumper was placed with Seagrave Fire Apparatus. Delivery is expected late in 1981.

The American Red Cross Bloodmobile used our hall for its monthly visits from June until December. This proved very successful for them because of the ample parking and spacious facilities.

Preparations have begun for our 150th Anniversary celebration to be held in 1981. Friendship Fire Company was organized in 1831.

Friendship's Softball Team was the 1980 Civic League Champs in the Winchester Recreation Program.

The fire lane, which we have been proposing for the last eighteen months, has been given final approval. The City will construct this lane from Bruce Street to Van Fossen Street as soon as the weather improves. Our response time to the north and northwest sections of the City will be greatly reduced.

Light Unit 1, formally Utility 1, has now been placed into service. After moving the 5" hose from Utility 1 to Engine 1, the unit was refitted with a 15,000 watt generator, four 1,000 watt and eight 500 watt quartz lights as well as approximately 750 feet of electrical cord. This unit will be available to any agencies in the area who needs to have a large area lighted up (ex.- fire scenes, searches for lost people and drowning victims after dark.),

We want to congratulate you, Lynn Miller, for being appointed Fire Chief of the City of Winchester, Va. We also look forward







- 3.) In July of 1980, the Sarah Zane Fire Co., placed the order for and made the purchase of a 1980 Mack MC 1250 GPM pumper, taking delivery, January 27, 1981. This new piece of apparatus, along with a full compliment of equipment, was purchased at a figure of just under the cost of \$100,000.00

1. The attached report is submitted to the Fire Chief, City of Winchester, VA for the operations of this fire company during the year 1980.
2. This report covers all calls, mileage used to answer emergencies, the equipment used, man hours at the station, scene and man hours of firefighters standing by waiting for any emergency.
3. A new Pierce/Chevrolet Salvage unit was placed in service for the community last April. This unit has a large cascade system to refill air bottles on the scene of emergencies, carries salvage equipment, masks, tools for salvage, and a 7500 watt generator to provide lighting and power at the scene.
4. During the year this company had 14 firefighters qualified as NFPA 1001 series Firefighter I, 9 as Firefighter II and 5 as Firefighter III, 4 qualified as pump operators and 1 as Officer level III. Taking the test but the results have not been received are 7 firefighters for the pump operators test, 5 as officers level I and 2 as officer level II.
5. Training of firefighters include state sponsored schools, Fire Academy and Lord Fairfax Community College, instation training, and Williamsport PA fire school. Special training like Foam classes, Crash rescue and firefighting for aircraft, CPR and First Aid are some of the other training received during 1980.


