The following report addresses the activities of the Fire Department during the calendar year 1987. General information within this report will reflect statistical information, comparative displays, goals accomplished during the year, and individual annual reports from the volunteer stations.

During the calendar year 1987, the department responded to 948 incidents of which 187 were actual fire related incidents taking place in property valued at \$52,739,293. Your Fire Department was able to handle the situation and limit the fire damage in these structures to \$669,747. As compared to 1986, the estimated property loss reflects an increase of \$191,077 or 39.92%. One explanation for the increase is the two (2) large loss incidents taking place at the same complex with damage approaching \$500,000. These incidents were at the Dixie Beverage Company and are classified as incendiary.

The incidents responded to resulted in eight (8) injuries to Fire Department personnel which is a decrease from eighteen (18) or 56% from 1986. Also there was a decrease in civilian injuries from ten (10) to eight (8) in 1987. These incidents also resulted in two (2) civilian fatalities for the year which remained the same as 1986.

The department has also been active in the area of training with a total of 10,822.3 hours of training being recorded. These classes have been conducted departmentally and in station with many receiving Virginia Department of Fire Programs credit. A breakdown of training per station is included within the statistical report for your review.

In cooperation with the Virginia Department of Fire programs and the Northern Virginia Firefighter Association, the Winchester Fire Department co-hosted the Annual Statewide Fire Training School on the weekends of November 7 & 8, and November 14 & 15. Instruction in subject material ranging from Firefighter I to officer level was administered during the school. Attendance of the overall school again set a new record with 213 individuals being involved in the training.

A Winchester Fire Department Training Committee was established in 1987. The committee is comprised of volunteer representatives from each of Winchester's four (4) fire companies and two (2) career personnel. The purpose of the committee is to examine the department's training needs, establish communication lines with firefighters, and set training goals and schedules for the department. An ambitious training schedule has been set for 1988.

The department conducted the 3rd Annual Fire Safety Days at the Apple Blossom Mall on March 20 & 21. Your department had for public review equipment displays, audio visual presentations, a puppet show and public fire education materials. It is estimated that in excess of 10,000 persons were contacted during the two day event.

Other Public Fire Education Programs were held throughout the year reaching another 5,114 citizens for a total of 3,959.25 instructional hours. This includes approximately 2,000 elementary level students that were reached during Fire Prevention Week and the six (6) week program on fire safety presented to all 5th graders in the City of Winchester. Due to limited budget and staff this overall activity of the Fire Department has not been increased and has decreased modestly.

Department personnel conducted the annual hose and apparatus tests during the year. These tests concluded with a minimal amount of hose loss and with all apparatus being in serviceable condition.

Also during the year two (2) 1987, 1500 GPM Seagraves' were purchased by the volunteer fire companies. One is housed at Friendship and the other at South End. Total cost of the two pieces of apparatus is in excess of \$400,000. This does not include equipment installed on the units.

Again in 1987 the department utilized suppression personnel to assist in conducting fire safety inspections. This procedure has been considered successful and is planned to be continued. This enables properties to be inspected which probably would not otherwise be completed due to limited staff.

Firefighter skills and knowledge testing was completed in June for all career firefighters and Lieutenants. All personnel participated in the evaluation process and successfully completed all aspects of the evaluation. This process is conducted on an annual basis for career personnel.

In cooperation with the Virginia Department of Emergency Services the annual update of the Hazard Identification Capability assessment and multi-year development plan was completed. Also the department has attended a conference addressing SARA Title III and hazardous materials response. These new regulations are again going to further stretch department resources.

The department is tentatively scheduled to receive a 10,000 gallon pressurized railroad tank car. Upon receipt the car will be located at the Winchester Regional Training Center for use as a training aid. The Training Center located off Woodstock Lane has for many years been a great asset to the department through the efforts of the Winchester Volunteer Firefighters Association and the Virginia Department of Fire Programs.

The department has also experienced an increase of fifteen (15) or 125% in incendiary fires for 1987. There were twelve (12) incendiary fires in 1986 and twenty-seven (27) in 1987. This increase has caused other duties and responsibilities of the department to fall behind as investigation of these incendiary incidents must be completed in an expeditious manner after or during the fire incident.

This year as never in the past, the department has met the challenge of filling six (6) vacancies in the career ranks. The work load in administering tests, interviews and training of the new firefighters has taxed both the career and volunteer personnel.

The volunteer and career personnel worked diligently to cover and maintain fire protection for the community. We are now at full authorized strength.

It is my intent to complete the long range plan for the department which will address the overall goals of the City. This is becoming a must due to the rules and regulations that are being mandated by both State and Federal governments and the growth of your community.

I would like to thank each member, officer and firefighter, both volunteer and career for their professional and dedicated service throughout the year. I pledge to you my continued cooperation and support to make our community fire safe.

I would also like to express my appreciation to Council, you and your staff and other departments for the cooperation given the Fire Department in the past year.




PROPERTY LOSS PER QUARTER

1987




EMERGENCY RESPONSES PER MONTH

1987




EMERGENCY RESPONSES

I am pleased to submit the annual report of the Friendship Fire Company for the year 1987. Included in this report are; manpower, responses, training and goal and objectives both accomplished and projected.

During the year the company set forth to provide better protection of it's Fire Fighters in the way of Protective Clothing. All personnel in the company now wear full turnout gear, including protective trousers. The use of hip boots is prohibited from all suppression activities including training.

The company purchased eight (8) complete sets of positive pressure breathing apparatus, bringing the total number of SCBA to nineteen (19).

In May, the company took delivery of a new Seagrave Pumper at a cost of over \$220,000.00 equiped. This pumper is the first four door fully enclosed cab in the City of Winchester, bringing about a safety standard for all companies to follow.

With the help of the Winchester Fire Fighters Assosiation, the company recieved and issued ten (10) pagers to our most active fire fighters, helping to increase our fire fighting force on the fire ground and as stand-bys at the station.

Our goal of a 48 hour minimum training was met by 88% of our active fire fighters. We achieved a more balanced total of training hours than in the past (based on average per fire fighter).

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES FOR 1988

- 1) All fire fighters with six (6) months or more to be Fire Fighters I certified.
- 2) Increase overall training at the station level.
- 3) Increase the level of training in Hazardous Materials and in Emergency Medical application.



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- 4) Increase the protection of our fire fighters by purchasing turnout clothing made of PBI material (six complete sets are now on order).
- 5) 100% participation in the Annual State Fire School held in Winchester, by our active fire fighters.
- 6) To explore the possibility of acquiring some type of a Foam Pumper.

I look forward to working with you, your staff and all of the Companies in Winchester during 1988.

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

This report is submitted to give a summary of the operations of the Rouss Fire Company for the year of 1987.

This report will cover all calls, equipment used, and manhours at the fire scene or on standby in the station. There are also reports on company training and mileage of apparatus.

During 1987 Rouss volunteers being dedicated to excellent firefighting service, trained in various schools on local, state and out of state levels. This training compiled to nearly 500 hours of in station, and over 600 hours of in or out of state training with a total of 1163 hours overall given by our 35 active volunteers. This year, Dennis Connor, a volunteer, was awarded "Firefighter of the Year" award by the City of Winchester.

In 1987, the Rouss volunteers spent a total of 42,000 manhours on emergency calls.

Through our volunteer driver program, Rouss was able to cover most all leave time for our four paid personnel. This time compiled for a total of 1,148 hours of volunteer coverage.

1987 was a year of most significant accomplishment for our company. We hope to continue excellence in firefighting service to the citizens of Winchester throughout the coming year of 1988.
