Dear Mr. Daley,

It is my pleasure to present the following report which highlights the activities of the Fire Department during calendar year 1989. The report contains statistical information for the period utilizing various graphs to relate comparative data, accomplishments of the department, reports from three of the four volunteer fire stations and highlights future goals.

The department responded to 1201 incidents during 1989, reflecting an 8.5% increase. These incidents resulted in 13 fire service casualties, 6 civilian casualties, and no fatalities. In addition, the incidents resulted in an estimated property loss of \$1,666,790. As compared to calendar year 1988 the estimated property loss increased by \$784,080 or 89%. The department experienced a major incident in the downtown area with an estimated property loss in excess of \$1,381,000. This incident occurred at 7-13 West Piccadilly Street. The fire originated in the kitchen of the Far East Restaurant and extended vertically and horizontally through the structure and to the frame structure located to the west. In addition, two structures on the Loudoun Street Mall sustained smoke, heat, and minor water damage.

The department experienced no fatalities and injuries to Fire Department personnel decreased by ten (10) injuries or 43% while civilian injuries decreased by three (3) from the previous year. This is a noteworthy statistic as the amount of fire related incidents and estimated property loss increased substantially.

Training continues to be a priority within the Fire Department for without a solid training program the department cannot be effective. During 1989 personnel of the Winchester Fire Department participated in 12,277.25 hours of either State and/or locally sponsored training. In October all career personnel who were not certified as EMT-A were trained as EMS First Responders. During 1990 EMS training will continue until all career personnel are certified as EMT-A's and D's. The department in cooperation

with the Virginia Department of Fire Programs and the Northern Virginia Firefighter's Association sponsored the 15th annual Statewide Fire Training School during November. The school boasted a registration of 319 students from across the Commonwealth and neighboring states. These individuals participated in subject material ranging from basic entry level firefighting skills to more advanced officer curriculums. Additionally 73 students from local industries participated in an Industrial Fire Brigade curriculum which was offered for the first time.

The Physical Conditioning Wellness Program was implemented within the department during the month of November. This should provide an improved quality of performance from all participating personnel as well as improving the overall longevity and wellness of department personnel.

The Minimum Training Certification Program completed its first year in December. Grandfather testing will be completed in June 1990. An evaluation of the program will be conducted at the conclusion of this time frame. This is an important program which must receive additional emphasis.

The department purchased and installed an integrated high pressure breathing air system at Shawnee Fire Company, Company 4. This project was in cooperation with Frederick County and will serve as the primary breathing air supply for both departments.

During the year the department contacted 2242 individuals and administered 1800.75 hours of Public Fire Education Presentations. Due to the increased work responsibilities the department is finding it more difficult to make these presentations. Education is a vital part of prevention and the solution to the fire problem in future years. I hope this aspect of fire protection will survive and grow in size and intensity.

During 1989 the Public Education Program conducted within the fifth grade of all City schools was reduced to a four (4) week program. The generosity of the Independent Insurance Agents and the support of Winchester City Schools have made the program a success for the past 12 years.

Final draft of the agreement pertaining to the establishment of a Hazardous Materials Level II-E Response Team has been formulated and submitted to the Department of Emergency Services, the City Attorney, and yourself for review and comment. This agreement is slated to be executed early in 1990 so the department can move forward with this project.

A fee schedule for Hazardous Use Permits relating to specific uses within the City of Winchester was implemented. It is projected that this project will be expanded within the next year thus enabling a comprehensive inspection program to be pursued.

The 20/20 Vision Committee presented their report in November. In my opinion the report accurately depicts the present status of the fire service and future needs. Whether implemented jointly with Frederick County or independently the recommendations of the report have much validity.

Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) was ordered and installed in the Emergency Communications Center (ECC). The department has temporarily detailed Firefighter Bowers to the ECC to assist in system implementation. Upon implementation the ability to dispatch emergency incidents in a more accurate and expeditious manner will exist.

The First Responder Program was implemented during December in cooperation with the Winchester Volunteer Rescue Squad. This program will provide immediate response of trained emergency response personnel to medical emergencies of a life-threatening nature. The implementation has been smooth between the department and the squad and the needs of the community are being served in an improved fashion.

The Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) has been extremely active in dealing with SARA-Title III Regulations. The contingency plan was completed and submitted to the Virginia Emergency Response Council for approval. The plan has been approved and is continually being evaluated and upgraded.

The Winchester Fire Department was presented a grant by the Department of Fire Programs in the amount of \$21,700 for capital improvements at the Regional Training Center. Capital improvements accomplished with this grant are as follows:

- o New electrical service to Storage Building, Restrooms, and Drill Tower. Provide interior and exterior lighting, as well as supplemental electrical supply.
- o Replacement of interior block walls and repair of the exterior concrete walls and ceiling of the structural burn building.
- o Installation of electric heat and window air conditioners for each classroom. A cosmetic face lift of all interior surfaces was completed to create an improved learning environment.
- o Repaired and recapped parking lot/work area with a heavy grade asphalt of 2" thickness.

The department applied for a grant in the amount of \$41,500 from the Department of Fire Programs for FY 89/90 to conduct capital improvement projects at the Regional Training Center. An amount of \$25,000 has been awarded to the City of Winchester. These funds will be utilized for constructing restroom facilities at the Training Center.

National Fire Prevention Week was observed by the department October 8th through the 14th, 1989. During this period career and volunteer personnel conducted presentations to all Kindergarten through Sixth Grade Classes within the Winchester Public School System.

I am pleased to report that the department is at full authorized staffing. The department had one vacancy which was created when Firefighter Fred Geanius was assigned to Headquarters on light duty following a heart attack in April of 1989, this vacancy was filled by Firefighter Todd Shiley. Also, Firefighter Chuck Shimp was hired in August to fill the additional authorized position.



Would it not be for the cooperation of the City Council, the volunteer stations, volunteer officers, career officers, staff, career and volunteer personnel, other departments, and yourself the department would be unable to serve the community.

I look forward to the challenge which will be presented during the decade of the nineties and to serving the citizens of Winchester.




PROPERTY LOSS PER QUARTER

1989




EMERGENCY RESPONSES PER MONTH

1989




EMERGENCY RESPONSES

I am pleased to submit, the annual report of the Friendship Fire Company for the year of 1989. Included in this report are: Manpower, responses, training and the goals and objectives for the upcoming year.

During the year of 1989, the Friendship Fire Company had an increase in membership activity and especially in training. The fire company replaced the front ramp to the station and replaced the bay doors. Total outlay for this project was in excess of \$35,000.00. The Friendship Ladies Auxillary refurbished our 1984 Chevy Suburban with new paint, siren and lights.

Our goals from 1989 were met: added eight set of PBI turnout gear, increased our training by 211.5 hours from the previous year and all active members met the minimum training requirements as set forth by the department.

As mentioned before, training is a top priority within the Company. During the year our members attended State Schools in Fairfax, Virginia Beach and here in Winchester.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES FOR 1990

- 1) Purchase five (5) additional sets of PBI turnout gear
- 2) Increase training in Haz-Mat and Emergency Medical
- 3) Expand the role of SERV 1 as an EMS assist unit in lieu of a pumper.

I, again, look forward to working with the City of Winchester, all the Companies of Winchester and those of the surrounding Frederick County area in 1990.


CPR Training in cooperation with the Lord Fairfax EMS Council and the Winchester Fire Department.

I am pleased to submit to you this annual operational report of the Rouss Fire Company for the year 1989. The following computer generated pages of this report show in detail these specific areas; Training hours, individual response totals for "on-scene" activity, incident related station "stand-by", equipment use, and apparatus responses.

Overviewing the operation of the Rouss Fire Company for the year 1989 reveals the following points of interest:
TOWER 2 -Recorded a total of 2,253 miles and 374 hrs. during 1989. Responded on 251 incidents.
TRUCK 2 -Recorded a total of 2,157 miles and 331 hrs. during 1989. Responded on 168 incidents.
Total milage for both vehicles amounted to 4410 miles which includes responses, service trips, training, and administrative duties. In 458 incidents Rouss personnel turned out individually 1668 times as on-scene manpower, and 411 times standing by in the station as a support group. (These figures include career personnel assigned to Rouss Fire Company.) Rouss Fire Company operated 279.83 hours on the 458 incidents answered. Rouss Volunteers logged a total of 1953.5 hours of training. these hours were attained in firefighting, E M S, and Hazardous materialson both state and local levels.
Rouss volunteer drivers covered 304 hours of duty time.

In closing 1989 we also close a decade and the bicentennial anniversary of the Rouss Fire Company. Looking forward into the 1990's we at Rouss anticipate years of significant accomplishments.
