Dear Mr. Daley,

During 1990 the Department made great strides in the direction of becoming a mature emergency response agency. The consolidation of Fire, Emergency Medical Services, and Hazardous Materials responsibilities into a single agency will have positive benefits for the community. Benefits which are already apparent are reduced response times and consolidation of personnel with regard to training and certification.

The following report highlights the activities of the Winchester Fire and Rescue Department during 1990. The report addresses accomplishments of the Department during the period, reports from the four volunteer stations and statistical data of a comparative nature.

During the year the Department responded to 2312 incidents, reflecting a 92% increase from the previous year. These incidents resulted in six (6) fire service casualties, seven (7) civilian casualties, and no fatalities. In addition, the incidents resulted in an estimated property loss of \$898,887. As compared to calendar year 1989 the estimated property loss decreased by \$767,903 or 46%.

As previously stated the Department experienced no fatalities and injuries to Fire Department personnel decreased by seven (7) while civilian injuries increased by one (1).

Training continues to be a priority within the Department, for without a solid training program the Department will not be prepared to effectively handle emergencies. During 1990 personnel of the Department participated in 12,994 hours of either State and/or locally sponsored training. Training in the three primary service areas will continue to be emphasized within the coming year.

The Department in cooperation with the Virginia Department of Fire Programs and the Northern Virginia Firefighter's Association sponsored the 16th Annual Statewide Fire Training School during November. The school boasted a registration of 330 students from across the Commonwealth and neighboring states. These individuals participated in subject material ranging from basic entry level firefighting skills to more advanced officer curriculums. Additionally 38 students from local industries participated in an Industrial Fire Brigade curriculum.

The Voluntary Minimum Training Certification Program for volunteer personnel completed its first year. Twenty-one volunteers were recognized for their successful participation in this program. The program will continue with optimism that all volunteer firefighters will either meet or exceed the established criteria.

The Department contacted 4531 individuals and administered 4333.25 hours of Public Fire Education Presentations during the period. Due to the increased work responsibilities experienced by the Department it is becoming more difficult to make these presentations. Education is a vital part of prevention and the solution to the fire problem in future years. I hope this aspect of fire protection will survive and grow in intensity.

The 5th Grade Public Education Program continued, but was reduced to a four (4) week program. The generosity of the Independent Insurance Agents and the support of Winchester City Schools have made the program a success for the past 13 years.

Winchester participated in a joint agreement with the Department of Emergency Services and Frederick County to implement a Regional Hazardous Materials Response Team. The apparatus is scheduled to be picked up early in 1991. After receipt equipment will be mounted and the unit placed in service as soon as practical.

Hazardous Materials Level II-E training was conducted for 29 emergency response personnel. Participating were nineteen (19) career and two (2) volunteer personnel from the Department. The remainder of the class was comprised of personnel from Frederick County and one (1) from the Front Royal Fire Department. This completed the initial training for Level II-E Team members. Much additional in service training will be required on a continuing basis.

Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) was implemented in the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) during the year. FF Bowers was temporarily assigned to the EOC to assist in building the data base from which CAD would operate. Original implementation has been relatively smooth. However, the fire reporting segment of the program is yet to be implemented.

The Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) has been active during the year with regard to SARA-Title III regulations. Jeff Rezin of the O'Sullivan Corporation was elected to chair the LEPC for calendar year 1991, replacing Councilman Partlow who had served as chairman for two years.

The Winchester Fire Department was presented a grant by the Department of Fire Programs in the amount of \$25,000 for capital improvements at the Regional Training Center. Capital improvements accomplished with this grant were:

- o Upgrade restroom facilities to include heat, hot water, showers, and locker rooms for men and women. This included remodeling the existing storage building and constructing a 12' X 20' addition. This will provide a 20' X 26' locker room and restroom facility.

National Fire Prevention Week was observed by the Department October 7th through the 13th, 1990. During this period career and volunteer personnel conducted presentations to all Kindergarten through Sixth Grade Classes within the Winchester Public School System.

I am pleased to report that the Department is within one position of being at full authorized staffing. The only vacancy presently existing within the Department is that of a SARA-Title III Clerk.

FF Fred Geanious retired from the Department after twenty-eight (28) years of service.

FF Steve DeHaven received orders to report to active military duty due to the Middle East Crisis. FF DeHaven will remain on active duty until June 5, 1991 unless the situation is resolved. There is also a possibility that his orders may be extended should the Desert Storm Operations escalate.

FF Ganoe completed the promotional criteria of the Department and was promoted to Lieutenant. Lt. Ganoe's current assignment is at Company 2 as the Station Lieutenant.

The first Annual Fire Department Picnic was conducted during July to recognize department personnel. The picnic was attended by more than a hundred firefighters and their families and was deemed a success. A get together such as this permits personnel to become more familiar with each other and increases team effectiveness.

Due to the growth in our community the service delivery responsibilities and methods utilized in the Department have and will continue to change if the citizens are to be served. The department has become a multi dimensional agency due to these changes. I feel that the Department is moving forward in concert with the needs of the community even though this movement is at times slow and in a catch up mode.






# PROPERTY LOSS PER QUARTER

1990




# EMERGENCY RESPONSES PER MONTH

1990




# EMERGENCY RESPONSES

1980-1990




# PROPERTY LOSS SUMMARY

I am please to submit the Annual Report of the Friendship Fire Company for the year of 1990. Included in this report are the following: Manpower, Responses, Training and the Goals and Objectives for 1991.

The year 1990 was the most productive year ever for the Friendship Fire Company. We had an increase in all areas critical to a Fire/Rescue Department. All goals and objectives for 1990 were easily met. In my twenty two years as a member of this Department, I have never seen such dedication to the Company and the fire service in general by our membership. The past year also brought our first year as an EMS provider with the First Responder Program. We added seven (7) members as First Responders or Emergengy Medical Technicians. 



VI. REMARKS

SOUTH END FIRE COMPANY  
ANNUAL REPORT

1990 WAS A YEAR OF CHANGE FOR SOUTH END. THE FIRST FULL YEAR OF EMS RESPONSE THROUGH THE FIRST RESPONDER PROGRAM, TRANSFERS OF CAREER PERSONNEL TO OTHER STATIONS, INJURIES TO CAREER PERSONNEL, NEW VOLUNTEER OFFICERS, AND THE FORMATION OF THE REGIONAL HAZARDOUS MATERIALS TEAM HAVE CHALLENGED THE COMPANY TO MAKE CHANGES IN OPERATIONS TO BETTER UTILIZE MANPOWER AND RESOURCES.

THE COMPANY RESPONDED TO 1193 INCIDENTS DURING THE YEAR, AN INCREASE OF 63% OVER THE PREVIOUS YEAR. 33% OF ALL INCIDENTS WERE FIRE RELATED, 53% WERE EMS RELATED, 7% WERE HAZARDOUS MATERIALS, AND 3% WERE OTHER TYPES OF INCIDENTS. THE COMPANY PROVIDED 4522 PERSONNEL ON THE SCENE FOR AN AVERAGE OF 3.65 FIREFIGHTERS PER INCIDENT , AND 2922 PERSONNEL ON STAND-BY FOR AN AVERAGE OF 2.4.

THE COMPANY LOGGED 1664.7 TRAINING HOURS OF WHICH 715.5 WERE STATE ACCREDITED. APPARATUS LOGGED 12099.5 MILES THROUGHOUT THE YEAR AND UTILIZED 22,950 FEET OF HOSE.

THE YEAR SAW THE TRANSFER OF THE STATION LIEUTENANT, TERRY BRAITHWAITE TO FRIENDSHIP AND THE ASSIGNMENT OF JIMMY HAINES TO THE STATION IN THE SAME CAPACITY. ALSO FF DONALD WHITACRE WAS TRANSFERRED. HE WAS STATIONED AT THE WINCHESTER VOLUNTEER RESCUE SQUAD, WHICH BECAME PART OF THE DEPARTMENT ON JULY 1st.


OTHER PERSONNEL CHANGES WERE INCURRED WHEN LT. HAINES BECAME INJURED AND FF STEVE DEHAVEN WAS ACTIVATED FOR MILITARY DUTY FOR UP TO ONE YEAR. THESE CIRCUMSTANCES PUT A TREMENDOUS LOAD ON VOLUNTEER PERSONNEL TO MAN THE STATION, A CHALLENGED THAT WAS MET VERY WELL. IN ORDER TO COVER THE PROLONGED ABSENCE OF FF DEHAVEN, FF WILLIAMS WAS TRANSFERRED FROM SHAWNEE FIRE COMPANY. ALSO THE COMPANY RECEIVED A NEW CAREER FIREFIGHTER IN WILLIAM A. HOGSTEN WHO WAS HIRED LATE IN THE YEAR.

ADMINISTRATIVELY THE COMPANY SAW CHANGE IN THAT THE COMPANY PRESIDENT WAS FORCED TO RESIGN DUE TO HEALTH. HIS RESIGNATION FORCED THE REALIGNMENT OF OTHER OFFICERS AND SHOWED THE NEED FOR A REORGANIZATION OF THE STRUCTURE OF THE COMPANY AND COMPANY BY-LAWS, A PROCESS THAT IS NOW CONTINUING. THE YEAR ALSO SHOWED A REDUCTION IN THE COMPANY DEBT TO UNDER 150,000.00.
