Dear Mr. Daley,

It is my pleasure to present the following report which highlights the activities of the Fire & Rescue Department during calendar year 1992. The report contains statistical information for the period utilizing various graphs to relate comparative data, accomplishments of the department, reports from two of the volunteer fire & rescue stations, and highlights future goals.

The Department responded to 3498 incidents during 1992, reflecting a 4.8% increase from 1991. These incidents resulted in 12 fire service casualties, 19 civilian casualties, and no fatalities. In addition, the incidents resulted in an estimated property loss of \$1,691,972. As compared to calendar year 1991 the estimated property loss decreased by \$1,551,913 or 48%. The Donald B. Rice Retreading incident created estimated loss of \$1,000,000.

Training continues to be a priority within the Fire & Rescue Department for without a comprehensive training program and participation in the same the Department cannot be effective. During 1992 personnel of the department participated in 12,250.25 hours of either State and/or locally sponsored training. The Department in cooperation with the Virginia Department of Fire Programs and the Northern Virginia Firefighter's Association sponsored the 18th Annual Statewide Fire Training School during October and November. The school boasted a registration of 225 students from across the Commonwealth and neighboring states. These individuals participated in subject material ranging from basic entry level firefighting skills to more advanced officer curriculums. Additionally 26 students from local industries participated in a Heavy and Tactical Rescue - Confined Space course as well as the Basic Brigade Training offered to Industrial Fire Brigades.

The Department received two box trailers for utilization in the Training Program. O'Sullivan Corporation and Roadway Motor Express presented the Department with the trailers which are located at the Regional Training Center.

The Department's Regional Hazardous Materials Response Team has been actively involved in specialized training to enable team members to conduct their tasks efficiently and safely. The Department hosted and assisted the Department of Emergency Services in presenting a Hazardous Materials Level II-E Training Class for new team members.

The Operation Zelda exercise was conducted in accordance with the Virginia Department of Emergency Services and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. This drill tested the City's capabilities to coordinate various agencies while dealing with a disaster situation. The drill was considered successful and identified various aspects of emergency preparedness which need modification.

National EMS Week was observed and included the display of equipment at the Apple Blossom Mall. The EMS Day at the Apple Blossom Mall was the first event of this nature. The event was received well by the community and will continue in future years.

The Fire Prevention Code was revised and introduced to Council. The revisions included local and state amendments and is anticipated to be adopted by Council during 1993.

The Department conducted a Mass Casualty Drill in conjunction with the Fire & Rescue Department of the County, the Winchester Medical Center, and various internal and external agencies. The drill was designed to evaluate the Emergency Medical Services aspect of the Department and Hazardous Materials Response. A great deal was learned from this drill which will assist preparing for future drills and incidents.

During the year the Department contacted 4,050 individuals and administered 4,396.25 hours of Public Fire Education Presentations. Education is a vital part of a fire protection program and an important element in solving the fire problem in future years. I hope this aspect of fire protection can be given the opportunity to grow in size and intensity in future years.

During 1992 the Public Education Program which is conducted within the fifth grade of all City schools was scheduled for the Spring of 1993. The generosity of the Independent Insurance Agents and the support of the Winchester City Schools have made the program a success for the past 15 years.

In December the Department implemented the automated incident reporting system on a trial basis. This has been an ongoing project and the implementation of the system January 1 on a permanent basis will complete another phase of creating a comprehensive incident reporting system. The next stage will be to incorporate incident reporting relating to medical emergencies into the overall program.

Grants were applied for through the Lord Fairfax EMS Council with one being awarded for the purchase of 12 suction units. The grant is a 50/50 matching grant which will provide \$2,700 for the purchase of the units.

The Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) which is a joint effort with Frederick County has continued to function and meet the criteria as set forth under the SARA Title III Regulations. The Committee has also initiated research into a community hazardous materials clean-up day and recycling efforts within the communities. During 1993 the LEPC will initiate a rewrite of the Hazardous Materials Contingency Plan.

National Fire Prevention Week was observed by the Department October 4 through the 10, 1992. During this period career and volunteer personnel conducted presentations to all Kindergarten through Sixth Grade Classes within the Winchester Public School System and distributed fire prevention materials.

The Third Annual Fire & Rescue Department Picnic was conducted during July to recognize department personnel. The picnic was attended by more than a hundred firefighters and their families. This event provides an opportunity for department personnel to join together in an environment other than emergency operations. The picnic continues to be successful and will be scheduled in 1993.

Due to the growth in our community the service delivery responsibilities and methods utilized in the Department have and will continue to change in order to better serve the citizens. The Department has become a multi dimensional agency due to these changes.


The primary goal of the Department during 1993 will be to increase the number and availability of trained operationally competent personnel within the Department to better meet the needs of the community. This will take a multi-pronged approach as recruitment, retention as well as training standards will become issues to be addressed. Due to the changing needs within the community it has become imperative that these measures be pursued.

Would it not be for the cooperation of the City Council, the volunteer stations, volunteer officers, career officers, staff, career and volunteer personnel, other departments, and yourself the department would be unable to serve the community.

I look forward to the challenges which will be presented during the coming years and to serving the citizens of Winchester.




PROPERTY LOSS PER QUARTER


EMERGENCY RESPONSES PER MONTH

1992




EMERGENCY RESPONSES

I am pleased to submit to your office The Annual Report of the Rouss Fire Company for the year ending 1992.


Through the efforts, and dedication of the volunteer and career staff, the Rouss Fire Company was able to meet many of it's goal's and objectives in training, response, standby's, and the growth of our membership. Although we had 31 fewer calls in 1992, we had good response from our personnel, and showed an increase of 196 personnel on the scene, and 284 on standby. All of our people worked, long hard hours, and I'm very proud of them!

In December we received our new tractor drawn aerial. A 1992 Spartan Gladiator 10 man tractor, with a Seagrave 100 foot ladder at a cost of \$281,000.00. Although we were late in receiving it, all of our members said it was well worth it. We know the city will make good use of it for our community. We also purchased 5 SCBA's and 5 spare bottles at a cost of \$12,324.00. We have also purchased and additional \$50,000.00 in new equipment for our new truck.

We have set some very demanding goal's for the coming year, and we are excited about getting started. Again, training will be the top priority.

I AM PLEASED TO PRESENT THE 1992 ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE SOUTH END FIRE COMPANY. 1992 WAS CONTINUATION FROM THE PREVIOUS YEAR IN THAT THERE WAS SIGNIFICANT CHANGE IN OUR OPERATION AGAIN. OUR NUMBER OF EMERGENCY INCIDENTS WERE INCREASED ALONG WITH OUR NEED TO INCREASE OUR PROFITS FROM BINGO.

WE SAW A NEED TO REPLACE OUR 1962 AND 1975 PUMPERS, WHICH WAS DELIVERED TO US IN EARLY SEPTEMBER OF 1992. THIS WAS NEW STATE-OF-THE-ART PUMPER FROM "SEAGRAVE," WHICH WE PLACED IN-SERVICE IN MID OCTOBER. WITH THE SELLING OF THE TWO OLDER PUMPERS, OUR DEBT ON OUR 1987 PUMPER WAS RETIRED AS OF THE NEW YEAR.

SOUTH END HAD A SIGNIFICANT INCREASE IN EMERGENCY INCIDENTS. OUT OF A TOTAL 3,497 CITY INCIDENTS, WE RESPONDED TO 1,080 INCIDENTS. OUR TOTAL TRAINING HOURS WERE INCREASED FROM 2,275 IN 1991 TO 3,089.5 IN 1992, WHICH WE HOPE TO INCREASE EVEN MORE IN 1993.

SOUTH END HAS ACCEPTED 8 NEW MEMBERS WHICH ADDS UP TO A TOTAL OF 29 FIREFIGHTERS. ALSO, 3 MORE MEMBERS HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED AS EMT'S WHICH GIVES UP A TOTAL OF 12 EMS QUALIFIED PERSONNEL. WE HAVE ELECTED NEW AND YOUNGER MEMBERS AS OFFICERS, WHICH SHOULD PROVIDE NEW ENTHUSIASM TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, TOO. OUR NEW BY-LAWS HAVE BEEN ADOPTED ALONG WITH BETWEEN THE VOLUNTEERS AND THE CAREER STAFF. AND, WE HOPE TO MAKE 1993 EVEN FOR SOUTH END AND THE CITY OF WINCHESTER.
