
Mt. Hebron Cemetery-1843

The year of 1994 was another active year for the Department and the five volunteer stations as it pertained to operations. The following report will highlight the activities of the Department. Reports from two (2) of the volunteer stations are also included within this report.

Statistical Review

As the Statistical Review indicates Incident History continues to reflect an increase. However, after a peak increase of 48% during 1990 it appears the percentage of incident increase may be stabilizing. Incident history indicates that 78% of incidents were Emergency Medical while 4% were Fire and 0.24% were Hazardous Materials. Additionally, 5% of incidents are Mutual Aid in accordance with the Mutual Aid Agreement.

The Fire & Rescue Department continues to recognize its responsibility to the community and the need to improve the efficiency of service delivery while incorporating new technology and maintaining fiscal responsibility. This creates a challenge for volunteer and career personnel alike.

The current recorded membership of the Department is 187 volunteer personnel and 26 uniformed career personnel with 2 civilian clerical staff. The recorded volunteer membership

reflects an increase of 27 from the previous year. To meet the challenges of today and the future it is imperative that the number of qualified individuals continues to increase.

In order to meet the challenge of quality service a departmental and station training program is active within the Department. This program assists in meeting the mandates set forth for career personnel and makes training available to volunteer personnel. During the course of the year personnel of the Department have recorded 9,707 hours of training in the emergency services area. This included training in subject areas pertaining to Fire, EMS, and Hazardous Materials as well as other ancillary subjects. Training records indicate that 5,518.5 training hours have been recorded by volunteer personnel and 4,188.5 by career personnel.

Quantity and quality of personnel is a vital element within the Fire and Rescue service. Technology can provide many tools to assist in performing a task, but the human element is necessary within this service area. Within this vein the Department is in constant competition with outside elements for personnel and their time. Whether competing with conflicts created by the Fair Labor Standards Act or with outside personal interests the fact remains that when 911 is called, response is needed and expected.

The Department is either currently addressing this competition or is developing means to compete with these factors. Among these already incorporated or planned are.

- o Coordination with Congressional representatives as related to the Fair Labor Standards Act.
- o Implementation of an Emergency Medical Dispatch System within the Emergency Communications Center. This will refine and create a consistent dispatch procedure for EMS incidents.
- o Finalization of a volunteer incentive/retention program for volunteer personnel.

The Department has created a position for a volunteer recruitment/safety officer. This position, when filled, will concentrate efforts on volunteer recruitment and personnel safety.

During 1994 the Department continued it's efforts in the area of Public Education. The 5th Grade Program was presented within the public schools and other programs were presented during Fire Prevention Week. The scope of this program must change to meet the responsibilities of the Department and the need of the community. It is hoped that modifications can be made in this program which will better address community needs with prevention as the focal point.

Fire/Arson investigation is an area of responsibility which is vital to an overall Fire Protection Program. During 1994 nine (9) incidents were determined suspicious in nature and twenty-one (21) identified as arson. This area of responsibility needs review and reorganization if expected to be successful.

The Regional Hazardous Materials Response Program is continuing in conjunction with Frederick County and the Virginia Department of Emergency Services. The program faces potential funding reductions from the Commonwealth during the 1995-97 Biennium. Should the funding reductions become a reality other funding sources will need to be developed to maintain minimal service levels.

The Department continues to move forward and accomplish specific tasks on a continual basis. The following identifies some of those items which were accomplished during the year:

- o Officers' Conferences were conducted for all volunteer and career officers on a monthly basis.
- o The Department sponsored and conducted Hazardous Materials Awareness Training.
- o Department supported the efforts of the Local Emergency Planning Committee relating to the SARA Title III Program.
- o Fire Prevention information pertaining to the holiday season was distributed within the community.
- o Interim measures dealing with Fair Labor Standards Act were implemented as adopted by Council.
- o Representatives of the Department participated in meetings and activities of the Lord Fairfax Emergency Medical Services Council.
- o Conducted two Emergency Responder Training Schools in conjunction with the Department of Fire Programs, Northern Virginia Firefighter's Association and Frederick County Fire and Rescue.
- o Addressed Police Department Staff concerning Fire & Rescue Policies/Procedures and how they could be enhanced by the Police.
- o The EMS Transport Unit purchased by Station 5, South End Fire Company, was licensed for EMS service and placed in service.
- o Observed National Emergency Communications Workers week by hosting a luncheon for the ECC personnel.
- o Hosted Clandestine Drug Lab Classes for Fire & Rescue and Police Department personnel.
- o Hosted the 108th Virginia State Volunteer Firefighter's Convention. The Convention was conducted August 10-13 and attracted 818 registered conventioners to the area.
- o Interviewed and executed a new Accident/Health Policy for volunteer personnel. Through these efforts we were able to increase the benefit levels while holding the line on cost.

- o A resignation was received from FF/EMT-A Austin White. Austin resigned and accepted employment with the Virginia State Police.
- o Recertification testing was conducted for individuals needing to recertify as an EMT. Career and volunteer personnel participated in this process.
- o Completed the SARA Title III Contingency Plan, received State approval, and published the Plan. The document was distributed in October.
- o National Fire Prevention Week was observed the week of October 9-15. During this period presentations were conducted throughout the community. Career and volunteer personnel conducted presentations within the community with primary focus on school-age children. Facilities which were visited are: John Kerr, Quarles, Frederick Douglas, Virginia Avenue, Sacred Heart, and Robinson Elementary Schools; Winchester Medical Center Day Care, First Baptist Church Mother's Day Out, Grace Lutheran Church, First Presbyterial Preschool, Winchester Day Nursery, Tiger Cub Troop, Sharon's Day Care, TLC Day Care, Cherub Day Care. These presentations directly contacted 2,465 students and adults.

This program is to be evaluated and consideration given to possible expansion of material.

- o Conducted extensive research, reviewed options, solicited volunteer input and conducted presentation to City Council relating to court decisions pertaining to Fair Labor Standards Act regulations and U.S. District Court rulings.
- o Participated in a presentation to Larry Smallwood by City Council for his many years of devoted service to the Fire & Rescue Services.
- o Conducted a presentation to City Council relating to the Department, the changing community, and service delivery goals.
- o Representatives of the Department attended and participated in a Regional Environmental Protection Agency meeting in Norfolk.

During the next year the Department is committed to enhancing services to the community. This will be a coordinated effort involving all personnel of the Department. As the Department Head I am committed to putting in place an incentive/retention program for active volunteer personnel. This program must be a program of active volunteer participation both from the perspective of its administration and activity.

An on-scene Safety Program including a personnel accountability system is a necessity. The incorporation of the volunteer recruitment/safety officer should make this a reality. The

success of this program will be directly related to the activity level of the operational personnel.

The year 1995 is going to be a year to complete unfinished projects and initiate those projects which will continue to enhance volunteerism and provide a safe and efficient emergency scene environment.

The personnel of the Department, both volunteer and career, are the backbone of the Department and service delivery. Their commitment, like the services they provide, must grow as the need of the community increases. The challenges of the nineties have been difficult with new demands for services, restricted budgets, new regulations, and increased community need. Even though faced with these many challenges the calls for service continue to be answered.

I would like to personally thank the men and women of the Fire & Rescue Department, including those involved with Emergency Communications for their dedication and willingness to serve.




PROPERTY LOSS PER QUARTER

1994




EMERGENCY RESPONSES PER MONTH

1994




PROPERTY LOSS SUMMARY

- 6) The Fire Company hosted the Virginia State Fireman's Association Reception and the 1994 Apple Blossom Festival Firefighters Reception.





The following is the annual report for the Charley Rouss Fire Company for the year 1994.

The Rouss Fire Company responded to a total of 953 incidents in 1994 an increase of 48 incidents over 1993. The company has approximately 30 active personnel. These personnel logged 1368 hours of training for 1994. Personnel are currently training as tiller operators, upon successful completion of this training an additional nine qualified tiller operators will be added to the roster. All three aerials and their compliment of ground ladders were tested in June of 1994 and required repairs were made and several ground ladders were replaced.

In 1995 the Charley Rouss Fire Company will strive to continue to provide the best possible protection to the citizens of the City of Winchester as it has in the past. We will once again concentrate on increased training and the recruitment of more personnel.
